# Session 1 • Thursday, 8:20 AM

#### 1A Firing the Synapses of Connection

Mallard Point

Elissa Thoman, University of Iowa Sara Sullivan, University of Iowa Will Sullivan, Student

Join a transformative exploration of neurodivergence where we'll delve into personal narratives—from undiagnosis to self-awareness—unmasking the unique experiences of neurodiverse individuals. We celebrate hyper-focus, advocate for justice, and embrace authenticity. Discover how we navigate a world designed for neurotypical people and manage overwhelming feelings. Through relatable stories, we'll demonstrate that neurodivergence exists on a spectrum, enriching our understanding of diverse minds.

#### 1B Graduating Is Happiness

Hawk's Ridge

Curt Graff, University of Iowa Irene Mandu, University of Iowa Degree Services reviews degree candidates after applying to graduate (Finals) and after the final grade run (Clearance). Working with our degree audit encoders, we developed a way to add messages when students have unmet degree requirements (e.g., missing hours or courses, low GPA) so they have a chance to resolve the deficiency; for example, a student may be able to add an off-cycle course, remember to file a Second-Grade-Only option, or remember to contact us for a note to be added to their application that they are transferring their final course. During Clearance, we partnered with ITS to develop a way to email students whose applications are Pending or Cancelled. Like our Finals outreach, these messages encourage students to contact Degree Services, their advisors, or their college offices to find a resolution and graduate before the applications must be cancelled. These actions have reduced the number of students who do not graduate and who do not know that they didn't graduate.

#### 1C Here's the Plan: Establishing a New Communication Strategy

Chelsea Burk-Betts, University of Iowa Kristan Hellige, University of Iowa

In 2022, Kristan and Chelsea inherited the University of Iowa's General Catalog from a team who had been producing it for nearly three decades. They soon set about assessing the existing communication about the catalog, its editing, and its publication, and learned a lot along the way. This session overviews how to perform a comprehensive communications assessment, including engaging with campus partners, plotting your team's communication goals, implementing your communication plan, and finessing the plan through further assessment. While the examples shared are catalog-specific, the strategies discussed may be applied to any communication plan.

#### 1D Process Improvement: Student Withdrawals

Liesl Fowler, Augustana College

We have all read in the literature, as well as experienced firsthand, the lasting impacts the pandemic has had on learning, growth, and long-held perspectives on the value of education. Many students no longer see enrollment in our institutions as an enduring commitment to a degree at a single campus, nor are they wedded to the idea that a degree path must take place over a set amount of time. Over nine months, Augustana College examined the off-ramps of the student experience by launching a process improvement initiative to study, evaluate, and streamline institutional procedures to create efficiencies and build a shared responsibility ethos surrounding

student withdrawals. Embracing the <u>Kaizen process improvement model</u>, adopted most notably by Toyota, an approach also known as <u>Lean Process Management</u>, this model was used to improve and streamline the student withdrawal process. Come learn how Augustana approached this issue and share how withdrawals work on your campus in this open dialog about process improvement.

He has helped non-profits, retail, government, and for-profit organizations improve their processes, empower employees, and produce greater value for their customers and students. Tom currently serves as Senior Director of Continuous Quality Improvement and Academic Operations at Capella University. This session will provide you with the tools and thinking to help you get on the same page with your team, make your work visible, and improve continuously.

#### 4A Redesigning & Streamlining Our Curriculum Approval Process and Timeline

The curriculum approval process was previously a point of contention among faculty members, who believed the process to be too long and excessively cumbersome with a common focus on the negative impacts to curricular innovation and nimbleness. A task force was created to craft a solution that 1) reduced the time needed to move from conception to approval of a curriculum change, and 2) ease administrative burden of curriculum approval on departments, faculty, and curriculum reviewers. This session will focus on how we moved from conception to implementation to overhaul our curriculum approval process and timeline.

# 4B Iowa State University's Office of Admission Workday Student Implementation: Lessons Learned

How have we been able to build schedules that serve the needs of our degree programs, faculty, and students - and avoid offering classes in a tent in the parking lot?

This presentation will share some of the creative scheduling ideas we've developed over the past 4 years and how we were able to impact change at DMU. We'll include strategies for presenting your ideas to administration, navigating campus politics, and using data to support your proposal.

#### 5B Service Excellence in Action: Strategic Approaches to Documentation

Typical conversations about documentation may imply succession planning scenarios to capture important institutional knowledge before colleagues retire. When it comes to change management, however, staff may also consider future implications, such as: How do I rework outdated information to fit a new team? How can I model a

continuity mindset in the face of long- or short-term absences? How can I quantify the tasks that I complete to advocate for increased resources?

Presenters from Iowa's Curriculum Management Team will showcase how they address these questions by incorporating documentation into their everyday roles. Although each presenter will speak to their area - degree audit, course library, program of study, sample plans, and general catalog – they employ widely accessible methods for audience usage and adaptation. Attendees will leave with an action plan to assess their own documentation processes, needs, and goals to manage and sustain a service excellence-focused office.
